What do they do?

There are four main types or 'branches' of **Nursing**, which relate to the four main groups of people they care for, which are Adults, Children, Learning Disabilities and Mental Health

Midwives provide care and support for women and their families whilst pregnant, throughout labour and during the period after a baby's birth. You'll work in hospitals, nursing homes, health centres, clinics or prisons.

In an NHS hospital you could work in accident and emergency, cardiac rehabilitation, outpatients, neonatal nursing or an operating theatre.

- good practical skills
- the ability to inspire confidence and trust in people
- the ability to remain calm under pressure
- good teamwork skills and the ability to work on your own initiative

How to become a Nurse or Midwife

To get into this job you'll need a degree in adult nursing. To register with the <u>Nursing and</u> <u>Midwifery Council</u> (NMC). Clearance from the <u>Disclosure and Barring Service</u>

Nursing degree apprenticeships are being developed in 2017. <u>Health Careers</u> have information about all nurse training, including nursing degree apprenticeships.

In order to gain paid employment as a Nurse or Midwife, you will need to complete a degree course at university. There are four different degree courses for Nursing depending on which area of nursing you would like to work in – Child, Adult, Mental Health or Learning Disability.

Universities generally require a relevant level 3 subject qualification such as an Access to Health Professions, Access to Science or a BTEC National Diploma in a related subject, plus GCSE's at minimum of grade A-C in English, Maths and Science. Some Universities may even require up to 5 GCSE's grade A to C including English, Maths and Science.

Universities also require applicants to have gained a certain level of points or credits on their level 3 qualifications.

You will also be required to have some work experience paid or unpaid, where you can demonstrate the skills and qualities required for the role, ideally in a Health or Social Care role, or any other role where you can show you have the transferable skills required.

Entry requirements, especially GCSE requirements, change on a yearly basis, please contact your local university for up to date entry requirements – See 'Where can I study' for more contact details.

Paid work experience can also be gained through a range of Social Care roles where personal skills and qualities are more important than qualifications. See your advisor or local work club for support with job search.

Volunteering can be a great way to get hands on experience and gain valuable skills and experience, as well as potential references from staff that you work with. Contact Manchester Volunteer Centre or your local NHS trust for local volunteer opportunities.
